Synopsis

For Halloween, Re-Imagined Radio presents (Ah-SEIZE-sha) (Ah-ZEEZ-jha) *Asezhia*, by Marc Rose and Jerrel McQuen. A legendary ancient jewel, stolen from Asezhia, a planet with a dark history, transforms into a hellish denizen with an insatiable hunger for death and blood. Even Emille Song, the telepathic Special Detective, may be out of his reckoning as he goes up against a skeletal fiend that can vanish in a ruby mist.

See Installment 39: 16 August 1982 for an essay about visiting Marc Rose and Robert Cannon, March 1982, St. Petersburg, FL, at Rose's home, to listen to an episode of *Dry Smoke & Whispers*.

The columnist urges his readers to catch the airing of an episode of "Dry Smoke and Whispers," a home-made radio drama featuring the sleuth Emille Song and his sidekick Professor Henchard on the planet Quaymet. The brainchild and work of 24-year-old Floridians Robert Cannon and Marc Rose, the science fiction detective series broadcasts over WMNF-FM in St. Petersburg, where Ellison met the creators and cajoled them into letting him borrow a couple episodes to broadcast over Mike Hodel's Hour 25 show on KPFK, on August 20, 1982.

SONG

Quaymet. My home. Teeming capitol of the Quintocracy. Five regions of space governed in relative peace sprawling across a third of our galaxy. But beyond that, the Frontiers. The Unknown. Filled with planets and beings beyond our control or ken. Explorers, scientists and reckless adventurers bring back tales and legends. And sometimes more.

Ah, the Unknown. It can be thrilling, when it's a rumor far, far from home. But when it's unleashed in your own backyard in the middle of a moonless night...

SFX: DISTANT SCREAM

This tale revolves around a distant rumored world of great beauty and instant death. An artifact brought back from it that we had enshrined right here in the capitol. An artifact, waiting to be reborn, that should have remained on its home world. A distant and exotic planet of jewel-encrusted cliffs and kaleidoscopic clouds known as ASEZHIA.

Welcome to Re-Imagined Radio, a program about radio storytelling. I'm Jack Armstrong. With each episode we combine dialogue, sound effects, and music to engage your listening imagination. This episode is no different, and here to tell you about it is John Barber, producer and host.

Thank you Jack. Hello everyone. Welcome.

The radio storytelling you're about to hear was written by Jerrel McQuen and produced by Marc Rose in 1989, both 31, living in the Tampa-St. Petersburg area of Florida.

I think it's a perfect episode for Halloween, which is just a week away.

This story, originally called "Vapors," is a sophisticated techno-noir drama of inter-dimensional terror. It was part of a program produced by Rose and MAC When called *Shreek Show*, a half hour commercial radio anthology series, leaning toward science fiction and horror.

With its fun tag line . . .

SFX: FROM ORIGINAL PRODUCTION, "IF YOU CAN HEAR IT, IT CAN SEE YOU" SHREEK SHOW.

HOST

Shreek Show was heard on national and international commercial radio stations, from 1988 to 1989.

After its premier broadcast, "Vapors" was shelved and never rebroadcast.

Until now, as an episode of Re-Imagined Radio. The name is changed--it's now Ah-SEIZE-sha ("Asezhia")--but the story is the same. A legend about The Ruby of Death and Ecstasy, rumored to be found on an ancient world of jewel-encrusted cliffs and kaleidoscopic clouds.

When the ruby is stolen, a beast appears as a predatory terror with an insatiable hunger for flesh, a thirst for killing, and a sensual desire for the exquisite moment when life meets death.

Re-Imagined Radio is pleased to once again broadcast this great example of radio storytelling. The cinematic sound qualities are especially striking. You may want to listen through your headphones for best effect.

Our radio storytelling originates from KXRW-FM. Vancouver, Washington's community radio station. We thank them for their support.

HOST

You're listening to Re-Imagined Radio. Our episode is Asezhia, written and produced by Marc Rose and Jerrel McQuen for their SciFi and Horror radio series, *Shreek Show*, heard on several commercial radio stations from 1988 to 1989.

Asezhia has its roots in *Dry Smoke & Whispers*, an earlier radio science fiction detective series by Rose and McQuen, produced when they both were 24 and launched January 18, 1980 with the tagline, quote "A Mystery Science Fiction Cinema in Sound Adventure" unquote.

Now, I can't remember being 24 years old, much less imagine creating something of the sweep and depth of *Dry Smoke & Whispers*. But I, and you, don't have to imagine. Harlan Ellison, author of 40 books and prolific columns of iridescent insight for *Future Life* and *L.A. Weekly*, was there. In St. Petersburg, Florida. In the Rose family

home. Where Marc and Jerrel played him a demo tape.

This was in March 1982, well before the digital turn and all its magic. And as Ellison wrote, quote "I am amused and captivated at the professional quality and the depth of imagination. Rose tells me he's done over 145 different voices for the show; he writes all the music; every bit of sound effects and editing is done right here, [in his home]" unquote (Ellison 334).

When he returned to Los Angeles, Ellison carried with him taped episodes of *Dry Smoke & Whispers*, which he arranged to be broadcast as part of Mike Hodel's *Hour 25*, heard on KPFK-FM.

Dry Smoke & Whispers, and *Asezhia*, takes place in another dimension. On the planet called Quaymet. The capitol of a galactic civilization. There, "Special Detective" Emille Song and Professor Durrick Henchard solve problems much in the mold of Sherlock Holmes and Dr. John Watson, with a dash of *Blade Runner* and *Casablanca* for spiciness.

The series ran for five years on public radio stations in sixty markets and three countries and received grants from The National Endowment For The Arts and the Florida Fine Arts Council.

Rose and McQuen paused *Dry Smoke & Whispers* in 1985 to pursue jobs with regular paychecks.

The pause was a short one. Only three years before Rose and McQuen began producing *Shreek Show*, in 1988.

McQuen relocated to Portland, Oregon, in 1996. Rose followed in 1999. There, they rebooted *Dry Smoke & Whispers* in 2004. *The Shadowman Saga* and other episodes were heard on Sirius/XM Satellite Radio and many public radio stations.

In 2008, *The Phantom of Delguire Manor* series was released.

Rose and McQuen engaged with Portland's audio drama / radio storytelling community. The Re-Imagined Radio episode, *WRW Retrospective*, chronicles their connection with the Willamette Radio Workshop, founded and directed by Sam A. Mowry.

So far, you've heard about a hellish denizen loose on Quaymet. Detective Song may be out of his reckoning as he goes up against a skeletal fiend that can vanish into a ruby mist.

Let's continue listening . . .

ACT 2: A DEMON IS LOOSED

SFX: DOOR OPENS

Song: Professor.

Prof. Henchard: I take it you have a hot case.

Trickles: Trickles, My name is trickles.

Beast: call us "beast."

THE FUSEBOX BREAK

HOST This is Re-Imagined Radio. I'm John Barber, producer and host. We'll return to Asezhia, in just a moment. But first I want to tell you about The Fusebox Show . . . It's a different kind of radio storytelling, full of quirky inter-dimensional conversation and comedy, and characters with their own sense of terror. Here's a sample . . .

Their story, a finely balanced mixture of adventure, imagination, and horror, takes place in another dimension, on a planet called Quaymet.

There, "Special Detective" Emille Song and Professor Durrick Henchard are up to their necks in trouble.

This year's remaining episodes include a tribute to the *Dimension X* science fiction series, and Volume 4 of our annual Christmas sampler.

Dimension X was one of the first science fiction anthology series produced for adult listeners. Many earlier series were geared for younger audiences.

Heard on radio from April 1950 to September 1951, *Dimension X* episodes were adapted from future visions by then contemporary science fiction writers, many of whom are now household names. Their visions of space travel and fantastic technology have proved quite accurate.

We'll sample from the first episode, "The Outer Limit," which may be the most used science fiction story on radio.

For our December episode we'll sample from a variety of early radio programs, each celebrating the holiday season with unique flairs. We've done this for the past three years and it's been quite popular with listeners. I hope you will join us again.

This episode is called Asezhia, the name of a distant world with a dark history. As we've heard so far, "Special Detective" Emille Song and Professor Henschard seek to find a beast with a penchant for killing . . . before it finds them.

Will they be successful? Let's return to our story and find out . . .

ACT 4: THERE ARE TWO OF US

BEAST: start cue: "You will feed our hunger. You will go out and find us a woman."

SONG: ". . . two metal bone talons, leaping out like snakes from the palms of white, alien hands."

SFX: BUILD TO CRESCENDO, THEN FADE OUT.

Our episode is Asezhia, a potent mix of inter-dimensional science fiction and horror by Marc Rose and Jerrel McQuen.

As I mentioned previously, Emille Song is a "Special Detective." What does that mean? Well, he's telepathic, and that special ability is about to pay off. Let's keep listening . . .

ACT 5: ALL IS REVEALED

SFX:

SONG: "the capital scrap yard, out in the metal zone, always set my heart pounding to the wrong rhythm."

SONG: . . . Remember soaring through the clouds, remember your freedom . . . Remember Asezhia. Asezhia.

As you've heard, Asezhia is an imagined world uniquely its own. An amalgam of 1930s detectives and gangsters, SteamPunk Victorian England, and vaguely exotic and alien Middle Eastern motifs.

But Emille Song seems real enough. A champion for justice, living on the vigilante fringe of a Future Society. The sort of person you'd linger with, over a cup of dark roasted WAX-a-quotal beans from the Central Highlands of Quaymet, listening to his stories. He's eccentric. Intelligent. And, at this techno-noir drama cliff hanger . . . he's in real trouble.

ACT 6: THE WORD OF FREEDOM

SFX: START CUE:

BEAST: Asezhia . . . That is the word of freedom. Now I remember.

SONG: It had been a desperate gamble, but it worked. Now we were about to find out who was what, and from where the evil and the ugliness had truly generated.

SONG: Scares me to think that the beast was totally created by the human side. What's scarier still is that, according to the legend, there's still one more

combined being, out there . . .
Somewhere . . . In the dead of the
night.

We just listened to Asezhia, written by Jerrel McQuen and produced by Marc Rose. Both live and work in Portland, Oregon, just across The Columbia River, but in another dimension of creative inspiration.

First broadcast in 1989, as part of their commercial radio series, *Shreek Show*, Asezhia has, like the demon monster at the center of the story, lay dormant, a jewel of radio storytelling waiting for an audience to breathe life into its inert form.

After more than thirty years, Re-Imagined Radio is pleased, and honored, to return Asezhia to its rightful medium of radio storytelling, transmigrating you to an alien universe, to bear witness to a thought-provoking drama of naked avarice and noble sacrifice.
